

ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI - FEAST DAY

Francis of Assisi was a poor little man who astounded and inspired the Church by taking the gospel literally – not in a narrow talist sense, but by actually following all that Jesus said and did, joyfully, without limit and without a sense of self-importance.

Serious illness brought the young Francis to see the emptiness of his frolicking life as leader of As-

sisi's youth. Prayer - lengthy and difficult - led him to a self-emptying like that of Christ, climaxed by embracing a leper he met on the road. It symbolized his complete obedience to what he had heard in prayer.

From the cross in the neglected field-chapel of San Damiano, Christ told him, "Francis, go out and build up my house, for it is nearly falling down." Francis became the totally poor and humble workman. Francis' first rule for his followers was a collection of texts from the Gospels. He had no idea of founding an order, but once it began he protected it and accepted all the legal structures needed to support it. His devotion and loyalty to the Church were absolute and highly exemplary at a time when various movements of reform tended to break the Church's unity.

During the last years of his relatively short life (he died at 44), he was half blind and seriously ill. Two years before his death, he received the stigmata, the real and painful wounds of Christ in his hands, feet and side. On his deathbed, he said over and over again the last addition to his Canticle of the Sun, "Be praised, O Lord, for our Sister Death." He sang Psalm 141, and at the end asked his guardian (local superior) to have his clothes removed when the last hour came and for permission to expire lying naked on the earth, in imitation of his Lord. Francis of Assisi was poor only that he might be Christ-like. He recognized creation as another manifestation of the beauty of God. In 1979, he was named patron of ecology. His poverty had a sister, humility, by which he meant total dependence on the good God. But all this was, as it were, preliminary to the heart of his spirituality: living the gospel life, summed up in the love of Jesus and perfectly expressed in the Eucharist.

Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi (Prayer for Peace)

where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.



Today the Franciscan Order flourishes throughout the world. The spirit of the Franciscan tradition is recognized as one of joy, gratitude, and care for the poor. The lives of the brothers and sisters witness to the transforming power of God's love in human lives and to the wondrous giftedness of creation. The focus on the love and the goodness of God manifested in all creation, and on our free response to God's grace is an important foundation for Franciscan self-understanding. This spirit is, perhaps, best exemplified in Francis's *Canticle of the Creatures*, a song for our times when reverence for creation is critical for a sustainable world and environment.




What do Franciscans offer today? By their professed lifestyle, holding lightly to the goods of the earth and walking gently and reverently through the world, we seek to remind the world that everything and every single human being is a gift from God. Thus we are all children and creatures of God and, thus, brothers and sisters to one another. Our minds are meant to be dazzled and pleasured by the vision of God. Franciscans witness to the fact that life can be lived joyfully and serenely with very few possessions and that the possessions we do have are only gifts to which we have no ultimate claim. Thus we are offered the gift of peace and joy through understanding who we are before God, how we are related to one another, to the earth and to the entire created universe.

Franciscans have a word to say to the world today—and that word is the Word of God who came among us to be one of us, who lived, suffered and died to show us abundant unconditional love. In the face of this incredible truth, we can only stand amazed. And when we stand amazed before this truth we know who we are and how we are loved. This is worship in its true sense. And it is the only real reason for anyone to be a Franciscan or a Christian today.

Saint Thérèse of Lisieux's Story

"I prefer the monotony of obscure sacrifice to all ecstasies. To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul." These are the words of Thérèse of Lisieux, a Carmelite

nun called the "Little Flower," who lived a cloistered life of obscurity in the convent of Lisieux, France. And her preference for hidden sacrifice did indeed convert souls. Few saints of God are more popular than this young nun. Her autobiography, *The Story of a Soul*, is read



Life in a Carmelite convent is indeed uneventful and consists mainly of prayer and hard domestic work. But Thérèse possessed that holy insight that redeems the time, however dull that time may be. She saw in quiet suffering a redemptive suffering, suffering that was indeed her apostolate. Thérèse said she came to the Carmel convent "to save souls and pray for priests." And shortly before she died, she wrote: "I want to spend my heaven doing good on earth."

Thérèse was canonized in 1925. On October 19, 1997, Pope John Paul II proclaimed her a Doctor of the Church, the third woman to be so recognized in light of her holiness and the influence of her teaching on spirituality in the Church. Her parents, **Louis and Zélie**, were beatified in 2008 and canonized in 2015. **Reflection**

Thérèse has much to teach our age of the image, the appearance, the "self." We have become a dangerously self-conscious people, painfully aware of the need to be fulfilled, yet knowing we are not. Thérèse, like so many saints, sought to serve others, to do something outside herself, to forget herself in quiet acts of love. She is one of the great examples of the gospel paradox that we gain our life by losing it, and that the seed that falls to the ground must die in order to live. Preoccupation with self separates modern men and women from God, from their fellow human beings, and ultimately from themselves. We must re-learn to forget ourselves, to contemplate a God who draws us out of ourselves, and to serve others as the ultimate expression of selfhood. These are the insights of Saint Thérèse, and they are more valid today than ever.

Laudato Si

"St Francis is the example par excellence of an integral ecology" (LS 10). His feast day, last Friday, was the pinnacle point of the Season of Creation -"a season of increased prayer and effort on behalf of our common home" (Pope Francis). St Francis considered it necessary to alternate times of work with some periods exclusively dedicated to prayer and contemplation. Exactly 800 years ago he went up Mt La Verna and received his stigmata, the challenging sign of this close intimacy of Jesus with Francis. Coming down from La Verna with a renewed capacity to recognize the mystery of both the cross and glory manifested in history, he comes down to renew his contract with the stigmatized of history, but he will also recognize the glory of the cosmos, writing his Canticle of Creation. Laudato Si' - "praised be" (Brother Sun and Sister Moon) are its first words in Francis' proto-Italian. https://ofm.org/uploads/Lettera San Francesco 2024 EN.pdf St Bonaventure said that "creation is the first "book" that God opens before our eyes" and that every creature becomes for us "a word of God" (Commentarius in Librum Ecclesiastes, 1,2). We need a profound change in the way we act within our ecological niche, to hope and act with Creation.




